Language is a funny thing. It seems like the more important a thing is, the less directly and more euphemistically we talk about it. We almost never talk directly about the birds and the bees, for example. And the number of euphemisms we use to talk about going on to Glory is astounding. In fact, you can often tell what part of the country people are from and what generation they were born into by the way they talk about death.

In the Bible, Mary was "with child." But before we had our children, Kim was "expecting." You never had to tell anybody what you were expecting. They just knew you were talking about an addition to the family.

We survived our first pregnancy with a book that Kim has since passed on to each of our daughter-in-laws in the appropriate hour. The book was called *What to Expect When You're Expecting*, and it walked us through the whole nine months with helpful hints and lots of "it's okay, this is normal" moments.

It's hard to believe we're talking about this already, but this newsletter covers events in church surrounding the upcoming season of Advent and Christmas. It's a busy and festive time of year, both within and outside of the church. Sometimes, in fact, it's so busy that we miss the wonder of it all.

Advent is a season in the life of the church given over to *expecting*. In some ways, if somebody asked us, we'd even say we were expecting a baby. Christmas even comes with its own "let me tell you about my birthing experience" story.

"We were out travelling, and I knew we weren't going to make it home in time to have the baby there. Instead, we were in this overcrowded little burg miles from home. There wasn't even a hospital or a hotel room. We wound up in a barn, without a doctor. It's a miracle we survived!"

We are expecting during Advent, and there's a baby involved, but the answer to the question "What are you expecting?" is more complicated than that.

In the generations leading up to the birth of Jesus, God's people answered this question in a lot of ways. There was a

lively belief that God was sending something remarkable and miraculous, but an awful lot of disagreement exactly what form it would take.

Some believed that God's coming would be apocalyptic, that the heavens would shake and God himself with all of the trappings of divine power would come down from Heaven and commence smiting left and right. The world as it had been known would come to an end, and a new world would be created with God in charge and His people vindicated against their faithless, heathen enemies.

Others had a more worldly view. The Essenes at Qumran were awaiting the rightfully anointed Priest of God to return and purify the Temple so that true worship could begin again. They were joined by the Zealots, who didn't necessarily look for a new priest, but rather believed that God would send a conquering military hero who would place the rightful king of Israel upon his throne.

The Pharisees believed that God would restore the fate of his people when the people had finally surrendered to complete obedience to God's written commandments. The Sadducees believed that God was quietly working His healing will through the earthly powers-that-be, many of whom (coincidentally) happened to be Sadducees themselves.

Exactly *what* they were expecting varied wildly. The one thing they all held in common was that they were expecting *something*, and they were expecting it to be big and change everything.

It's fair to say, though, that nobody expected what actually happened next: God clothing himself in human flesh to serve, suffer, and die at the hands of sinners. God's work in the world came in such an unexpected form that all but a handful totally missed it and only learned of it after the fact.

As we move into Advent, we do so with a sense of wonder and expectancy.

Even if, perhaps, we're not exactly sure what to expect next.

The Growing Place


