Treasure Maps

As I write this, I'm getting ready to travel with my family for vacation. This year's trip takes us to the Carolina seashore. To be honest, I'm not much of a beach guy... at least not in the lay and bake in the sun for hours sense. I can splash around in the waves for a bit and I'm pretty much done.

I do like walks on the beach, though. Especially those early morning moments before everybody else has arrived. There is a special sort of solitude that seems to only happen at the beach. Maybe it has to do with being able to see the nearest people as specks in the distance, or with the wash of white noise from the surf which enforces a sort of counterintuitive silence.

I think another reason I like walks on the beach is that I've never quite outgrown the notion that I'll discover a pirate treasure. Don't laugh. It happens to people.

In fact, I never take a walk on the beach without discovering some sort of treasure. God is endlessly creative in making beautiful things, and I've discovered many such on beach walks. Some of them can't really exist anywhere else. I've picked up glistening rainbows from the sand that turn to very ordinary bits of rock or shell when they dry out in my pocket or on my night stand. It's really not that big a stretch to think I might find a giant pearl or stumble over the lid of a wooden chest full of doubloons sticking up out of the sand.

Jesus told a pair of stories about such finds. (See. It's even in the Bible! We'll see who's laughing when I come home carting a treasure chest.) In each of his stories, Jesus remarks that the wise course of action upon stumbling on hidden treasure is to sell off everything to obtain the precious treasure. Buy the whole plot of land, if you have to, to get possession of that which is priceless.

The point of the parable, of course, is to think of God's

Kingdom as something beyond value, for which we ought to be able to sacrifice any amount of worldly wealth. In practice, though, the parable breaks down a bit. God's Kingdom is not quite as concrete as a treasure chest. We can't thump on it to make sure it's real, or get an objective appraisal from an outside source. God's Kingdom is a spiritual reality which is sometimes difficult to define and almost always more a matter of faith that of sight. Of course I would buy a field with a material treasure chest in it if I had seen and touched the treasure. But would I buy a field simply because I *believed* it had a treasure in it, perhaps based on a fragment of a treasure map or a sliver of a dream?

The prophet Jeremiah is faced with almost exactly this dilemma in Jeremiah chapter 32. His cousin is trying to unload a piece of property outside of Jerusalem. The property is of questionable value, because it has been overrun by the invading Babylonians. Jeremiah can buy it for the equivalent of "back-taxes."

Jeremiah is in a quandary, because he is on record as believing that the Babylonian invasion was inevitable and that resistance was futile, that Jerusalem and the whole nation of Israel was destined to fall. This will not be good for real estate values.

But Jeremiah also believes that God will ultimately forgive and restore His people. Jeremiah buys the land. His faith is that in spite of all appearances in the moment, God has a special future for His people. He invests in an invisible future.

Well in advance of Jesus' parable, Jeremiah has already lived it out.

It takes a special sort of boldness to invest ourselves in things we can't yet see or prove, but it is exactly this sort of boldness to which God's people have always been called.

Barbara Singleton Shares Her Love of Handbells

Dr. Barbara Singleton may be retired from her job as a teacher and consultant in early childhood education, but she continues to "teach" as part of an extended FUMC music ministry. On the first and third Thursday of each month, Barbara and her husband Tim work with the residents at McCready Manor to read music and play hand chimes. It was an idea inspired by Ginger Wallace and Shirin Gardner that grew into another outreach ministry of FUMC. "The ringers and the activities staff appreciate our church's sharing the two octaves of chimes that bring music to the residents there," Singleton said.

Singleton has been ringing and directing handbells for 32 years. She started in Albuquerque, New Mexico, but has played and directed handbells in West Lafayette, Indiana, Lexington and Richmond. She was a charter member of Alluring Community Handbell Ensemble in Lexington which is still an outstanding handbell choir in central Kentucky. She has also served six years as Kentucky State Chair in the handbell Musicians of America. It has been a labor of love shared by her husband Tim and their children. Daughter Amy and grandson Caleb both ring at McFarlin UMC in Normal, Oklahoma.



For the past 16 years, she has directed handbells at FUMC and shared her passion with ringers who have played for services in area churches as well as FUMC, and on at least one occasion, accompanied the Lexington Philharmonic as part of its Christmas concert.

Singleton would welcome anyone who might like to try ringing. "We are always in need of additional ringers," she said, "more ringers would give us the ability to utilize our five octaves." The FUMC Cannon Bells Ensemble currently has eight regular ringers; five more would make it possible to use all the octaves. Singleton would welcome anyone for a rehearsal on Wednesday evenings at 6:30 or at McCready on the Thursdays that they are there.

Singleton points out that handbell ringers tend to become addicted to ringing because of the unique sound of handbells ringing melodically together. "One way for new ringers to hear and feel the music is to attend a festival with many handbell choirs ringing the same music. It's hard not to get goosebumps listening to 600-800 ringers ringing together," she said.

While she encourages new ringers to join the group, she expresses her appreciation for the support of FUMC over her 16 years here. "Our ringers enjoy making music that lifts praises heavenward and blesses each of you," she said.

"Anytime would be a good time to join us," Singleton added. Anyone interested in becoming addicted should give her a call at 624-5861.

Why pack a shoebox? Because the shoebox gift is all about Evangelism, Discipleship and Multiplication! Here is a brief report from Malawi to give you an idea of the true impact of what Operation Christmas Child is all about.

Shoebox Gifts Result in New Churches in Malawi

Doors are widely opening up in spiritually dark villages in Malawi. Recently, following OCC shoebox outreach events, two villages in the Lilongwe region of the country witnessed the baptism of over 100 people total. These villages are hard to reach due to evil traditional beliefs and high illiteracy. At one OCC shoebox outreach event in November, over 400 children were invited including a village chief. A few days later, a children's ministry and bible study meetings were launched. Since then, two churches have been planted following the baptism.

In order to keep the village youth active, strong, and socially connected, new soccer teams have been formed using many of the balls that were included in shoebox gifts. PRAISE GOD!

One local pastor is very excited and sees another opportunity of establishing literacy and nursery centers to keep supporting the **5000** plus children in these villages.

Not only does your shoebox gift show a child that he/she is loved, it opens doors to entire communities coming to know Jesus. And once they know Him, they reach out to others providing help and a sense of community that only can happen because they have come to love God.

Our church will be celebrating our tenth year as a Drop Off Center on July 29th, which is also Unity Sunday. I hope you will come celebrate with us!
